Independence Day (informally the Fourth of July) is a federal holiday in the United States commemorating the Declaration of Independence, which was ratified by the Second Continental Congress on July 4, 1776.

The Second Continental Congress declared that the Thirteen Colonies were no longer subject to the monarch of Great Britain, King George III, and were from then on united, free, and independent states. The Congress voted to approve independence on July 2 and adopted the Declaration of Independence two days later, on July 4.

Independence Day is commonly associated with fireworks, parades, barbecues, carnivals, fairs, picnics, concerts, baseball games, family reunions, political speeches, and ceremonies, celebrating the history, government, and traditions of the United States.

But what is so significant about this day that makes Americans of every race, religion, or political affiliation stop to celebrate? Do most people even know what they are celebrating or is it just a day off from work or a free pass out of class?

Government is the governing body of a nation, state, or community.
